<p>2. Search:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Try several different sites and different keywords and strategies b. Keep track of sites you've searched and keywords you've used c. Consult Table of Contents of a valued textbook for alternative terms 	<p>Talk with your liaison librarian.
