


CARLI Collection Management Committee Project: Collaborative Collection Development

Our FY17 Project continued the committee work begun in FY16.







Pilots for FY17

- E-books: 90 books chosen and 32 purchased by 13 member libraries
- Education: K-12 Textbooks selection list created,
 6 member libraries purchased 9 textbook sets
- Literature: Meeting focus turned to OA books
- Nursing, Business: Loss of those leading the projects resulted in loss of traction
- One-time Purchases: 144 books purchased by 4 member libraries, 79 remain unique in I-Share

Quantitative Assessment

- 23 libraries participated
- 29 librarians participated
- 185 titles selected, including textbook packages and consortial ebooks
- \$38,500 spent on print and e-books

Qualitative Assessment

- Ebooks create both challenges and opportunities.
- Choose communication and collaboration technologies carefully.
- Libraries face obstacles to committing time and resources to projects outside of their own institutions.
- There is a need for strong leadership and guidance in collaborative collection efforts.

Future plans

- Increase E-books purchased by providing members a selection list to choose from.
- Continue education and one-time purchase collaboration while also trying to expand the number of participants.
- Focus on Open Access titles for all subjects, not just literature. Create guidelines for adding titles to I-Share and member catalogs and then recruit volunteers to help create a collection of records that may be loaded into I-Share and/or individual catalogs.




Project Inspiration: Increasing Budget Challenges

"The system has leaked oil for years but became completely derailed this fall when the library was delivered a fiat."

"It is impossible to steal from the monographs line any further -- it is already obliterated."

"It's not a situation of 'Phew! We cut what we need to cut!' It's a moving target."






Perennial Reasons for Recent Serials Cancellations

- Inflation
- Budget issues
- Protect/restore monographs budget

In other words... \$\$\$



Cuts Are Not Victimless



- o Fewer monographs
- o Fewer print journals
- o Fewer ejournals
- o Subject areas with high cost/low use journals
- Impact on relationships:
 - With existing vendors
 - With faculty teaching in historically expensive and/or underutilized subject areas



Surprising and Positive Results

- Demand-driven decisions
 - Discovered that core titles did not earn their keep, while outliers were maintained
 - Added new subscriptions (less expensive than on Get It Now)
- Alternative access points
 - o Offered access to additional resources through Get It Now
 - o Learned that many previously purchased articles are OA
 - o Tracked a negligible increase in ILL
- Better practices
 - o Actively promoted usage of key items
 - o Codified a deaccession schedule
- Thought leadership opportunities
 - o Positioned the library as central to OER discussions on campus



Topline learnings: Informed Decisions

- Blend data with subject/industry knowledge
- Make decisions based on actual and projected usage
- Investigate no cost/low cost alternative sources
- Get back to basics
- Remain nimble

- Available synchronously and asynchronously because they are recorded
- All supplementary materials on CARLI website: slides, handouts, links, lesson plans, mapping to the ACRL Framework for Information Literacy for Higher Education
- 84 people registered for the Showcase and 14 responded to a post-event survey

Annual Instruction Showcase



PROJECT GOAL

Plan: Provide a step-by-step process to writing a disaster plan for institutions of all sizes and resources. CARLI members identified disaster planning as an area they needed help with in a Preservation Committee survey two years ago.

Product: A website that covers all the elements of writing disaster plan. The website provides a one stop shop for disaster planning information. Each member of the committee focused on one area for the monthly preservation tips, and the end product is a website:

OVERVIEW OF RESOURCE SHARING COMMITTEE FY17 ANNUAL PROJECT

The Committee compiled data from, and analyzed trends in, the ILLINET Interlibrary Loan Traffic Survey for FY2012 to FY2016 (the last five years for which info. was available).

The Survey

- summarizes the total number of interlibrary-loan requests that libraries process
- breaks down the requests into additional categories, such as returnables vs. non-returnables and in-state vs. out-of-state


In evaluating trends over this five-year period, the Committee hoped to


- prompt further investigation into topics such as the connections among interlibrary loan volume, patron needs, and collection-development policies
- provide useful information for libraries to plan, evaluate, and revise their interlibrary loan and collection-development policies (libraries that complete the Survey can log in to the Counting Opinions website to view and download the data)

METHODS


The Committee's workflow for data preparation

- 1. download raw data reports from the Counting Opinions site
- 2. deduplicate data, so that they were provided only once for each institution
 - for some reporting years, individual library branches reported their statistics separately
- 3. review data to determine which questions from the Survey would be used as comparison data points

CONCLUSIONS

We hope this analysis provides useful data for academic libraries and gives a snapshot of recent trends in resource sharing within Illinois.

- The data analysis shows that interlibrary loan requests, although declining, remain of inherent value to library services.
- The Committee feels this study is just a start for further data analysis by ILLINET libraries through accessing the Counting Opinions website.

Trends in the data encourage further investigation into these possible connections.

- · trends in campus enrollment
- changes in patron resource needs
- library space reorganization (print as smaller percentage of collection)
- faculty involvement in libraries / promotion of library resources
- cost-effectiveness of purchasing vs. borrowing materials
- the availability of open-access content and full-text databases
