Method(s) of Data Collection and Analysis	The study consists of pre- and post- surveys following OER presentations or workshops provided by the libraries (completed at Lake Forest and Joliet Junior College), as well as virtual interviews with faculty on the topic of OER (interviews have not been conducted at this time). The survey platform is LibWizard, and interviews will be conducted via Zoom or other web-meeting software. We collected the recorded responses in LibWizard and exported the tables to compare the responses of participants before and after viewing the presentation. We did not have a large enough sample for in-depth analysis of the responses.
_	the responses.
Findings	22 faculty members filled out the pre-survey and 13 faculty members completed the post-survey. The recording of the Joliet Junior College presentation was viewed 42 times and 10 participants attended the presentation at Lake Forest College. The top barriers identified were difficulty finding OER resources, lack of time to search for or create OER, and concern over students without reliable internet accessing materials. After the presentation, the percentage of faculty that found locating OER as a barrier decreased (from 69% to 36%) The barriers related to lack of time did not significantly change. The percentage of benefits increased for every category, but it should be noted that 9 faculty members completed the pre-survey and not the post survey.
