Single Sentence Abstract	This is a study to determine faculty perceptions regarding incorporating Open Educational Resources (OER) into their courses and how they perceive their institution's library as a potential resource for adopting, adapting, or creating OER.
Motivation(s) for Project	Our research team believes that obtaining faculty buy-in of OER as a desirable alternative to traditional textbooks will be crucial to our OER programs' successes, however obtaining that buy-in will also be the most difficult task with which we are faced. While there is a good deal of research literature available regarding potential benefits of OER and faculty perceptions about barriers to using OER, there is less evidence of best practices for persuading faculty to adopt, adapt, or create OER, particularly regarding the most effective ways that libraries can persuade faculty to take advantage of their OER resources and the expertise of their librarians.

Inquiry Question	How do faculty perceive OER in general, and in what ways, if any, do faculty believe their institution's library or librarians can assist them with adopting, adapting, or creating OER?



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Study Participants/Population	Faculty communities at our respective colleges
Method(s) of Data Collection and Analysis	<p>The study consists of pre- and post- surveys following OER presentations or workshops provided by the libraries (completed at Lake Forest and Joliet Junior College), as well as virtual interviews with faculty on the topic of OER (interviews have not been conducted at this time). The survey platform is LibWizard, and interviews will be conducted via Zoom or other web-meeting software.</p> <p>We collected the recorded responses in LibWizard and exported the tables to compare the responses of participants before and after viewing the presentation. We did not have a large enough sample for in-depth analysis of the responses.</p>
Findings	<p>22 faculty members filled out the pre-survey and 13 faculty members completed the post-survey. The recording of the Joliet Junior College presentation was viewed 42 times and 10 participants attended the presentation at Lake Forest College. The top barriers identified were difficulty finding OER resources, lack of time to search for or create OER, and concern over students without reliable internet accessing materials. After the presentation, the percentage of faculty that found locating OER as a barrier decreased (from 69% to 36%) The barriers related to lack of time did not significantly change. The percentage of benefits increased for every category, but it should be noted that 9 faculty members completed the pre-survey and not the post survey.</p>
Use of Findings	<p>The findings are being applied at Joliet Junior College to help determine further OER initiatives by the library to meet specific faculty needs. For Lake Forest College the</p>



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	findings indicated that faculty are not ready to explore OER as course materials at this time.
Next Steps and Other Results	For Joliet Junior College, the goal is to use the information from this survey to help create an OER taskforce at the College to facilitate faculty adoption of OER. Next steps at Lake Forest College include incorporating OER as part of a long-term strategic plan. Participating in a group project allowed us to share ideas across institutions and apply the process and possible findings for each faculty population.
Additional Reflections	It was helpful to have an OER presentation affiliated with the institution's faculty development initiatives to get more participation from faculty. It was also beneficial to network with librarians from different institutions during the pandemic.
