Types of qualifiers - / always at the end can use not more than 1 per type

- Format
- Year
- Microform / not
- Source

Material type – mt:

- Can use qualifiers as material type
- Can customize MT list via guided search
- Click on box to the left and choose the types most used
- Can be used anywhere in the search command
- Can use Boolean not

- Use appropriate OCLC symbol
- Combine with subject area su:
- Year yr:
- Created date dm:20220131
- Cataloging source cs:his

Truncation and Wildcard

- Truncation *
 - Use at the end of a word
- Wildcard ? and #
 - ?(1-9) use to replace up to 9 characters; must have 3 characters before using
 - Can use at the end of a word
 - If using for 1 character no need to include the number 1; use only?
 - # Use to replace 1 character within a word

Phrase/Whole Phrase

- Difference between keyword and phrase
 - KW will find phrase anywhere as individual words or phrase
 - Phrase/whole phrase (=) more precise; will search words together
 - Ex. ti= pn= (name MUST be inverted)
 - Whole phrase (suw=) used for subject heading search
 - 650 \$\$a, x, v
 - Music materials uniform title
 - 200 \$\$a

To summarize

- Word searches use the : (use in any order and as many as preferred)
- Qualifiers use the / (end of the search string)
- Truncation use the * (end of word or date)
- Wildcard use the ?(1-9) (at least 3 characters of the word before inserting)
- Wildcard use the # (replace 1 character with at least 3 characters in)
